

FARM CROPS

GENERAL RULES: All exhibits must have been completed during the past 12 months. Any exceptions must be approved with the Vocational Agricultural Committee.

YOUTH: Any Jackson County Future Farmer of America member may exhibit in Section A through H if it is carried as part of his/her Supervised Experience Program. **Prize money will be paid in no more than five (5) classes per exhibitor in Farm Crops (if funds are available).**

ADULT & YOUTH OPEN CLASS: All classes are open to adult exhibitors, and they will be designated by the class number followed by the letter A. Individuals may enter only one exhibit per class and only one entry in each class per family/garden. **Prize money will be paid in no more than five (5) classes per exhibitor in Farm Crops if funds are available.**

AWARDS: In any one class there must be more than five entries for Best of Fair ribbon to be awarded or more than two blue ribbons in a class. Grand and Reserve Champion of Fair may be awarded based on quality. A trophy will be awarded for Grand Champion and a plaque for Reserve Champion. Best of Fair will receive \$2.00 Premium Award.

Awards: Blue: \$7.00; Red: 5.00 White: \$4.00

Prize money will be paid in no more than five (5) classes per exhibitor in Farm Crops (IF FUNDS ARE AVAILABLE).

SECTION A – CORN AND CANE

- Class 106 - Ten ears of corn (previous year's crop)
- Class 106A - Ornamental Corn (4 ears)
- Class 107 - Five stalks of corn (cut at ground level)
- Class 108 - Quart of shelled corn
- Class 109 - Five stalks of cane (cut at ground level)

SECTION B – TOBACCO

- Class 110 - Best stalk of tobacco topped
- Class 111A - Best hand of primings, this year's crop
- Class 111B - Best hand of tobacco, last year's crop

SECTION C – SMALL GRAINS

- Class 112A - Quart of Oats
- Class 112B - Quart of Wheat
- Class 112C - Quart of any other small grain

SECTION D – FORAGE CROPS

(1/4 bale, about four flakes tied both directions)

- Class 113 - Alfalfa
- Class 114 - Alfalfa – grass hay (under 50% Alfalfa)
- Class 115 - Clover Hay
- Class 116 - Mixed Hay (any grass under 50% legumes)
- Class 117 - Orchard grass hay
- Class 118 - Timothy hay
- Class 119 - Small grain hay
- Class 120 - Small grain straw
- Class 121 - Aftermath or second cutting
- Class 121A - Alfalfa – Legume (under 50% alfalfa)

SECTION E – SILAGE (Displayed in double plastic bag)

- Class 122 - Any type silage

SECTION F – SORGHUM AND HONEY

- Class 123 - Strained Honey (1 quart)
- Class 124 - Chunk Honey (1 quart)
- Class 125 - Sorghum (1 quart)

SECTION G – POTATOES (unwashed)

(Will be displayed on a paper plate furnished by the Fair)

- Class 126 - Any red variety potato
- Class 127 - Kennebec (7 potatoes)
- Class 128 - Irish Cobbler (7 potatoes)
- Class 129 - Any other variety (7 potatoes)

SECTION H – VEGETABLES (unwashed)

- Class 130 - Home garden display. Six or more varieties of fresh vegetables displayed in a basket or foiled cardboard box both inside and outside.

SECTION I – HORTICULTURE PRODUCE

- Class 131 - Produce displays

Each exhibit will contain quantity listed by class and displayed on paper plates furnished by the Fair. Maximum of five different vegetable entries per exhibitor. Best of Fair will be awarded in each section as explained in general rules. Grand Champion may be awarded by sections.

- Class 131A - Beans, Green Snaps, plateful
- Class 131B - Beans, Lima, plateful
- Class 131C - Beets, five, tops cut off
- Class 131D - Cabbage, one head
- Class 131E - Cantaloupe, one
- Class 131F - Carrots, five, tops cut off

- Class 131G - Cucumbers, six
- Class 131H - Eggplant, two
- Class 131I - Onions, five, unpeeled and tops cut off
- Class 131J - Peppers, five
 - J1 - Bell
 - J2 - Sweet Banana
 - J3 - Hungarian Wax
 - J4 - Chili
 - J5 - Jalapeno
 - J6 - Cayenne
 - J8 - Other

- Class 131L1 - Sweet Corn, Yellow five ears husked and wrapped in plastic wrap
- 131L2 Sweet Corn, White five ears husked and wrapped in plastic wrap

- Class 131M - Squash, **three**
 - M1 - Zucchini
 - M2 - Yellow
 - M3 - Acorn
 - M4 - Butternut
 - M5 - Kusha
 - M6 - Other

- Class 131N - Tomatoes, **five**
 - N1 - Red
 - N2 - Yellow
 - N3 - Pink
 - N4 - Mixed Color
 - N5 - Cherry
 - N6 - Other

- Class 131P - Watermelons, **one specimen**
- Class 131Q - All other vegetables

SECTION J - HORTICULTURE FRUIT

(No more than three entries per class)

- Class 132A - Apples, five
- Class 132B - Grapes, three bunches
- Class 132C - Peaches, five
- Class 132D - Pears, five
- Class 132E - Plums, five
- Class 132F - Small fruits, 1-pint basket
- Class 132G - Cherries, 1-pint basket

SECTION K – UNUSUAL HORTICULTURE PRODUCE

Class 133A - Most unusual vegetable, shape, size, or color

Class 133B - Largest specimen of any garden or field crop

(Class 133A and 133B one entry per exhibitor and family)

SECTION L – EGGS

Class 134A - Brown Eggs – 1 dozen

Class 134B - White Eggs – 1 dozen

Class 134C - Other – 1 dozen
